ELECTIONS – THURSDAY 2 MAY 2024

On Thursday 2 May residents will be invited to elect Councillors to Dorchester Town Council. The Council has a total of twenty seats and all of them are up for election.

If you are passionate about Dorchester, we need you. As a Councillor you will become a voice for your community and effect real change. You will be a community leader and represent the aspirations of the townspeople. Town and parish councillors are the most local part of our democratic system and are closest to the public. By standing for the Council you could make a real difference.

Remember you will need photo ID in order to vote. Check online to find your polling station.

Also taking place on the same day include elections to Dorset Council and an election for the next Police and Crime Commissioner for Dorset.

TOWN COUNCIL TURNS FIFTY

2024 marks the 50th anniversary of the establishment of Dorchester Town Council following changes to local government in 1974.



To celebrate this significant birthday, the town council will be providing a free family fun day in Borough Gardens on 29th June and holding a civic reception in the autumn.

D-DAY 80TH ANNIVERSARY

On Thursday June 6th from 7.00pm, we'll be commemorating the 80th anniversary of D-Day with an event at Salisbury Fields. A choir of local children will perform and serving US soldiers will read accounts of American GIs stationed in Dorchester in World War II before the lighting of the beacon at 9.15pm.

On Saturday June 8th, they'll be actors and historical vehicles stationed around the town bringing to life Dorchester's wartime past.

These events are funded by a grant of £9,933 from the National Lottery Heritage Fund.

REMEMBERING THE ROMAN BATHS

It's 47 years since archaeologists revealed part of the extensive remains of the Roman baths underneath what is now the Wollaston Field car park in Dorchester. The baths lay in the centre of the Roman town and comprised an extensive complex of hot and cold baths / plunge pools and hot rooms with mosaics and underfloor heating.

The Dorchester Joint Heritage Committee would like to do more to provide information to the community about the baths both online and on site. DORSET COUNCIL LOCAL PLAN


You may remember that back in January 2021 Dorset Council consulted on its proposals for a new Local Plan for Dorset. The proposals included earmarking land across the water meadows north of Dorchester (shown in orange on the map) for 3,500 new houses, 25 acres of employment land plus new healthcare facilities and schools.

The Town Council objected to this proposal for the following reasons:

- Because of significant infrastructure requirements the site would not be financially viable
- Increasing the town's population by around 35%, over 7000 new residents, would place enormous pressure on a town infrastructure
- The environment and heritage damage
- No other sites in the wider area had been properly considered

These proposals have not gone away and Dorset Council will, towards the end of the year be publicising its draft Local Plan for comment. The original proposal, the consultation responses and the revised timeline can be found at

Finally, Councillor Alistair Chisholm, Mayor of Dorchester, presented the children with a certificate and a DTC badge each!




GRANTS FOR COMMUNITY GROUPS

Over recent months, the council's Management Committee has awarded more grants to support events and good causes across the town, including:

TOWN'S PART OF COUNCIL TAX RISES 2%

The Town Council share of the council tax will rise by a below inflationary 2% in April, with a Band D charge of £210.33, an increase of £4.12 for the year, raising £1.72 million from the DT1 taxpayers. DTC have long had a policy of small and steady 2% increases, at or around inflation. This policy has meant the taxpayer is less impacted at times of higher inflation, whilst also not impacting the long-term financial position of the council.

Councillors considered a number of issues when setting the budget for 2024/25, including:

- The costs of the coming local elections in May
- An increase in the Councillor training budget to ensure newly elected Councillors are well trained to carry out their roles to a high standard
- A one-off budget for the purchase of equipment for the new Town Crier
- A £10,000 budget for community grants
- Additional costs associated with maintenance of the Great Field

IMMEDIATE JUSTICE IN DORCHESTER

The Government's Immediate Justice scheme is an unpaid work pilot run by Offender Rehabilitation organisation 'Red Snapper Managed Services' that is aimed at individuals responsible for committing antisocial behaviour related offences.

It was rolled out across Dorset late last year and the busy Christmas period provided the programme with several service users who were keen to carry out the work and give back to their local community. You may have seen them in action litter picking at the Great Field.

Speaking to members of the public observing the scheme in action, Dave, the Immediate Justice Supervisor, has been encouraged by the level of positive support for the scheme.
