# HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL DAY 2024

All are invited to attend the annual Holocaust Memorial Day (HMD) event on Friday 26th January 2024 at the Corn Exchange, Dorchester, DT1 1HF - 12.30pm - 1.30pm.

Visitors are welcome from noon, to view displays and meet with the organisers.

HMD 2024 is being organised by a partnership made up of Dorchester Town Council, the South-West Dorset Multicultural Network (SWDMCN), Dorset Council and Kushti Bok.

The theme for this year is the 'Fragility of Freedom' which will explore the idea that freedom is a fragile concept and one we should not be complacent about. Eroding our freedoms is often a subtle, slow process, but if left unchecked can pave the way for far greater crimes to be perpetrated against populations.

Holocaust Memorial Day (HMD) 2024 marks the 30th anniversary of the genocide against the Tutsi in Rwanda when the world stood by as Hutu extremists shattered the fragile freedom in Rwanda, following decades of tension and violence, culminating in the murder of over one million Tutsis in just one hundred days. This happened 49 years after the Holocaust ended and just 19 years after the genocide in Cambodia.

The event will include readings and poetry, including contributions from local schools, and will conclude with the lighting of candles and a minute's silence. Free refreshments will be available afterwards.





# SEND IN YOUR D-DAY STORIES

2024 will mark the 80th anniversary of D-Day. Dorchester had a huge part to play in this historic day. The town hosted many allied military personnel from around the world in the run up to D-Day and many Dorchester residents also took the journey across to France to take part in the military campaign which marked the beginning of the liberation of Western Europe from Nazi control.

Dorchester Town Council is planning how it can commemorate this anniversary and wants to gather any Dorchester D-Day memories. # DORCHESTER'S HISTORIC CORNHILL MARKET

A market has been held around Cornhill since Anglo Saxon times. Dorchester became the County Town in 1305 and in 1629 was granted a Market Charter by Charles I. The Charter is managed by a Joint Markets Panel which is made up of Councillors from Dorset Council and the Town Council.

Nowadays Cornhill is a vibrant local market, an ideal destination for stall holders new and old to showcase their talents and products. With a strong sense of community and affordable pitch fees it offers an ideal platform for businesses to grow and develop.

# 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE PARTNERSHIP BETWEEN DORCHESTER AND LÜBBECKE

Following the successful and enjoyable visit of the Mayor of Lübbecke to Dorchester in June members of the Lübbecke Society were invited to visit Lübbecke together with the Mayor and Mayoress. The celebrations which took place during the Bierbrunnen Fest in August. Seven members of the Society travelled to Lübbecke to join Alistair and Kate to represent the town. We were joined by a civic group from Bayeux, our other twin town, a three way partnership.

At the civic reception we heard speeches which reflected the depth of our friendships, what we share in common and the importance of maintaining these links. The Kantorei, with whom the Dorchester Choral Society exchange, sang to welcome us. As a gift from the Lübbecke Society to our hosts we had taken beer from the Cerne Abbas Brewery as well as some celebratory mugs. After lunch we were driven in a vintage coach belonging to the Barre Brewery for guided visits to a nature reserve on the Turfmor, a museum with a unique collection of automatons and a restored farm house where we had a rustic dinner.



The following day was sunny and with the silver band playing and the beer from the local brewery Barrebrau it was most relaxing as we met up with old friends and made new friends. There was time to wander around the old part of the town and enjoy our hosts hospitality. We are delighted that some of our Lübbecke friends have said that they would like to come to Dorchester next year, a visit that had been planned for in 2020 and delayed by the pandemic. Also next year we are planning a visit of our youth football team to Lübbecke and so our friendships will continue with the next generation.

# **GRANTS FOR COMMUNITY PROJECTS**

The town council offers small grants (typically up to £500) to support a range of community projects. The grant applications are considered by the council's Management Committee.

At the meetings in July and September councillors awarded the following grants:

£150 for the dulcimer music workshops and performances. £500 for Dorset Poverty Action towards a project to provide school uniforms to help families on low incomes (pictured). £500 for Dorset Family Support to help provide food parcels to children in receipt of the Pupil Premium over the school holidays.

£500 for As One theatre company for their 'They Came from Úkraine' community workshops (pictured).

We still have funding available. So please submit your grant application to the council by end of December 2023 so that it can be considered by the Committee in January. The application form can be found on the town council website.





# NEW HUMAN SUNDIAL PLAQUE IN THE BOROUGH GARDENS!



Pop down to the Borough Gardens to try out the newly updated human sundial! To use the sundial, stand on the designated spot, and your shadow will indicate the time on the sundial's hour markers.

The old instruction tablet was not very clear so the Friends of Borough Gardens commissioned a new instruction tablet made from Portland Stone so more people could use and enjoy this fascinating feature.

The sundial was previously installed by Damers School over 30 years ago but was moved when the Gardens were renovated in 2007. It is now positioned in the main lawn to the south of the Bandstand.



# CAROLS IN THE GARDEN

Carols in the Borough Gardens is one of the traditions of Christmas in Dorchester.

Taking place on Thursday 21 December and organised by the Friends of the Borough Gardens and the Town Council, the Carols are for everyone to join in, with music from Dorchester's own band - the Durnovaria Silver Band, and singing from the group 'Encore'. The music starts at 6.30pm and lasts for about an hour and it's free!

All are welcome to add to the atmosphere by bringing their own home-made lantern. Carol books will be provided. (Please note that in case of very bad weather the event may be cancelled so keep an eye on the Borough Gardens Facebook page for information).

## HOW TO MAKE A LANTERN

Lantern Crafting Materials:

- Colourful tissue paper
- LED tealight
- PVA glue
- Sturdy scissors to cut the top off the bottles
- Pipe cleaners



• Clear 2 litre plastic bottle

1. Wash the bottle and cut off the tapered tops.

2. Plan your Christmassy design.

3. Cut the tissue paper into shapes to make your design and stick them to the inside wall of the dry bottles using glue.

4. Optional: Decorate on top of the tissue paper using paint and/or marker pens.

5. Punch holes into the upper lip of the cut bottles and thread the pipe cleaners through to make a handle.6. Place the LED tealight inside the lantern and admire your creation!



## SCOUT POST

Sadly, we've been informed by the district Scouts that there won't be a Christmas Scout Post from this year onwards.

After 35 years, with only a short break due to Covid, the scheme has had to wind up.
