### Please walk on the Flowers

The Mayor's charity project for 2014/15 is to create a Grass Free Lawn in the Borough Gardens.

With Dorset Wildlife Trust (DWT) a group of councillors visited Reading University in June, where a post-graduate student has grown and maintained a lawn made up entirely of small-leaved low-growing plants such as milkwort, trefoils and clover.

The result is a low maintenance, drought resistant, matted lawn which has flowers year round, and is very wildlife friendly. The biggest hurdle has been a natural reluctance to walk on the lawn.

DWT will lead the project, distributing trays, seed and compost to anyone who feels able to grow plants. Some will go to schools and community groups, but they are particularly keen that individuals get involved, and will be handing out materials at Poundbury Garden Centre on Friday

On Easter Monday 5<sup>th</sup> April 2015, a planting day is planned for the Borough Gardens, with trays placed onto pre-prepared soil.

The lawn will be maintained by volunteers, and become a resource for schools and local groups to observe, enjoy and learn from.

The 2013 Try This Poultry keeping event was particularly popular with residents, although the chickens weren't so sure.

Mayor Peter Mann says "I am delighted with this opportunity to create the first grass free lawn in a public park in the south west of England. It will add further interest and colour to our beautiful Borough Gardens, attracting large numbers of bees and butterflies, recently in sad decline. I very much hope that townspeople of all ages will get involved. The more trays that are planted, the larger the lawn will be."

No special horticultural skills are required. If you have space for a few seed trays in your greenhouse, conservatory or on your window sill,



come down to Poundbury Garden Centre and get involved. .

We are currently working with DWT to see how we might integrate the lawn into a redesigned Bowling Green area, with other elements still to be designed.

## **Dorchester Transport and Environment Plan: Update**

In the Spring newsletter we asked residents to help us review new ideas based on public suggestions following consultation in December 2013 in relation to the way traffic moves across the town.

During June town councillors and county staff met with over 30 residents, and that exercise has helped shape some new options.

The Highways Team presented amended options that had the effect of reduced traffic volumes in the High St area, lessened traffic increases on South Walks Road and Great Western Road, but produced increases on other roads such as Williams Avenue and in the Fordington and Maud Road areas. Proposals from December 2013 that affected direction flow around North Square and directed buses though Princes Street were to be dropped.

The strongest message that came from the meetings was that schemes that simply redistribute the High Street problem to other parts of town will not achieve widespread support. However town councillors recognise that traffic and parking issues will only get worse as the town grows, unless traffic and parking infrastructure is improved.

An important issue that emerged from discussions was that the search for a solution was delaying the replacement of ageing traffic light equipment. County officers will look at how improvements might be introduced now, which will improve traffic flow through town in the short term, but can be adapted to future changes in road layouts. Revisions to loading bans and on street parking may also be considered.

Dorset County Council's Cabinet will receive a report on options in September, and will decide whether to proceed to consultation on a revised scheme, or progress the elements of DTEP that include the delayed replacement and improvement works.

Once the future of the transport element of the package has been determined West Dorset District Council will review the options for environmental improvement works in the town centre.

To complement the above work the Town Council has agreed to co-ordinate discussions between the larger employers in the town to develop a comprehensive parking strategy for the many workers and visitors to the town.

### Development of the Dorchester Prison site

Residents will be interested in the future of this important site just to the north of the town centre, following its closure as a prison in December 2013.

The Ministry of Justice, faced with high running costs for an empty site, started the process of marketing the site in June, and invited bids by mid August.

The Town Council recognised that, with the District Council currently having to focus on the submission of its new local plan, there was a risk that potential developers could buy the site without having a sense of the needs of the local community.



With the help of Dorchester Civic Society, for which we are very grateful, we have drafted a Position Statement suggesting how the site might develop.

An early draft of the statement has been shared with the Ministry of Justice and their agents, and they have agreed to pass it on to potential developers.

The statement focuses on the site's potential as a residential led development, and we will challenge developers to consider how they might use the scheme to meet the needs of the town's younger residents.

We also think there should be public open areas with good pedestrian and cycle links from the north and west of the site, full recognition and interpretation of the important heritage on the site, and preferably some non-residential development to encourage footfall across the site. It is vital that the site is not considered in isolation and is properly integrated into the area that surrounds it.

The Town Council and Civic Society will consider the document for adoption in September. We will then invite the statutory planning and highways authorities to take note of the statement when they consider applications for the development of the site. The draft statement can be found on the Town Council website.
