Borough Gardens Makeover

Preliminary work has started on the conversion of the Bowling Green area at the southern end of the Gardens into two new tennis courts.

With a lot of earth to be moved out and new materials to be brought in the project is now scheduled to open in the early summer.

The new courts will provide an even greater reason to buy one of the Council's £25 fobs that allow year round unlimited use of the tennis courts for a whole family.

At the same time the iconic Gardens clock is under wraps while it is being fully refurbished, which involves stripping back to bare metal

for the first time in 100 years, then repainting with new paint designed to last for 10-20 years.

The play fountain now has a new surface, installed at the end of last season, while the Council is also reviewing management arrangements for the refreshments kiosk, with the aim of reopening it by May.



Draft Community Plan launched for consultation

Community Development Officer, Emma Scott, has been working with local groups and organisations to identify key priorities for the town this year.

Drawing on a "Directory of Community Aims", put together after extensive consultation, Emma has drawn up a list of priorities that include fundraising advice and improved networking and collaboration.

Specific proposals encompass hosting community networking lunches, setting up a health and well-being event and support for a pilot project to offer mental health support to young people.

Great Field consultation sparks ideas for plan

Over the autumn period the Duchy of Cornwall led an exercise to gather views regarding how residents want to use the major new space being made available at the western end of the town. Town Council staff supplemented the drop in events by working with young people from local schools.



The key components of the design are likely to be a major new play space, near to the park entrance of Damers School and a shared pathway network suitable to the needs of foot and wheel-based users.

Other features are likely to include an amphitheatre space built near the western esplanade, seating, planting and further play and free running equipment to encourage movement around the whole space.

How will Dorchester grow in the future?

Revisions to the West Dorset, Weymouth and Portland Local Plan require that land be identified for 4,500 extra homes to be built across the area in the next 20 years, with Dorchester a specific target location.

Wherever houses are planned they are controversial; the next extension to the town could be bigger than Poundbury. But at the same time the town needs more homes, particularly for young workers.

Last Autumn the District Council consulted on options for development around the town. Although the greatest impact of growth will be at Dorchester the number of



responses from residents locally was much lower than from other areas of West Dorset.

In May 2018 the District Council will narrow options down and consult on preferred sites to be included in a revised Local Plan.

When the chosen sites have been identified the Town Council will hold an event to collect your views so it can take account of them in its final response.

Affordable Housing or **Play and Open Space?**

As a Council one of our priorities is Affordable Homes for Young Workers and this led to the plans to develop the tennis courts adjacent to Trinity Street Car Park.

The Town Council recently decided to work with Magna Housing to consult the public regarding 5 other sites around the town that might be suitable for affordable housing

- Elizabeth Place play area & green space, Victoria Park
- A play area at Poundbury Crescent
- A play area between Mellstock Avenue and Holbaek Close
- A green space between Thomas Hardye Gardens and Sandringham Sports Field (known as Sandringham Annex)
- Fortress Green open space at Celtic Crescent, Castle Park

Consultation has already started to identify the negative impact of developing these sites, as well as the number of properties they might make available for young people.

Tax to rise 3% to save valued local services

The Town Council share of the Council Tax will rise 3% in 2018, a Band D charge of £189.00, up £5.50 on last year, with smaller increases of 2.0% planned in future years.

The rise will help the Council to reduce the impact of cuts to locally valued services currently run by Dorset County and West Dorset District Councils, who face with increasingly difficult budget decisions and are refocusing available cash onto their statutory obligations.

It is guite possible that DCC and WDDC will disappear in 2019, replaced by a single unitary Dorset Council. Inevitably the focus of the new organisation would be on major services including social care, highways and waste management, leaving Town Councils to play a lead role in safeguarding local services such as public toilets, TICs, support for local arts, museums and community organisations and keeping public areas tidy.

Our main income comes from Dorchester Council Tax pavers, we will receive £1.4M in 2018/19. While most of this funds our own services we now have £177,000 a year ready to support at risk District/County services. While this gives us a head start we know it will not be enough to safeguard all services we believe to be at risk.

In discussions about the future we have asked the District Council to share some of the income from car parks and other assets with us to help fund services which are regularly used by visitors to the town.

Town Council services, such as the Borough Gardens, Cemeteries and our Events programme, will continue to be developed as the town grows. We invest money up front to reduce future costs, and look for more efficient ways of delivering services; little wins such as a wood chipper to reduce our green waste, hanging baskets with reservoirs to reduce watering and asking our sports teams to play a greater role on match days; it all helps.

Council has allocated reserves for a number of our own and partner projects during 2018-19, mentioned elsewhere in the newsletter. We are also developing a Community Plan to help local groups working in our community to develop to take on new roles.

This may in turn lead to formal planning applications being made by Magna later in the year.

The Town Council has already decided that play equipment will still be needed on two of the sites if they are progressed and is also concerned to ensure that existing parking arrangements are not worsened.

KeeP106 to go on air this summer

Dorchester's new community radio station could be broadcasting by late May if everything goes to plan.

OFCOM have allocated the 106.3FM frequency to the not for profit Community Interest Company. The Town Council has agreed to fund the purchase of a new 100w FM transmitter, while the Project Team are still fundraising for other set up and running costs; they recently secured £1,500 from West Dorset DC.

Meanwhile refurbishment works continue at the studio at the historic Little Keep. If you have construction skills that you can lend or material that you might donate they would love to hear from you.
