A single Unitary Council Borough Gardens kiosk for Dorset

In April 2019 West Dorset DC and Dorset CC will merge into a single new Dorset Council, along with 4 other District and Borough Councils across rural Dorset. Elections will take place for both the new Unitary Council and the Town Council on 2 May 2019, with the current 2 county and 9 district councillors being replaced by 5 councillors for the new Council.

The merger has largely been driven by a need to reduce costs across both tiers as a result of ongoing reductions in Central Government grant, although there are clearly also administrative and co-ordination benefits in combining two the tiers.

It is not at all clear which services the new Council will prioritise, but there is a real chance that discretionary services valued by our local community and visitors to the town will suffer as a result of the reorganisation. West Dorset District Council has previously funded these to a much higher level than elsewhere in the county, supported by extra income from town centre car parks and a significant property portfolio.

Services such as Public Conveniences, the library-based TIC, grant support for local Arts, Museums, Community groups and levels of street cleaning and highway maintenance may all, to some degree, suffer.

District and Town Councils have been talking for some time about the transfer of some discretionary services, but there is a stumbling block; how would the town pay for them? Without access to new sources of income, primarily from car parking, the Town Council will only be able to safeguard a small part of the services likely to be at risk.

At present there are no discussions taking place with Dorset County Council about discretionary services that they currently deliver that might also be threatened.

While waiting for the reorganisation to happen the Town Council continues to focus on a review of our budgets; any savings here will create capacity to help local groups to take on services that might otherwise

The separate articles on other pages highlight how local sports clubs in particular are stepping up to the challenge of taking on facilities and running them in a different way, which both improves the delivery of sports such as cricket and football, but also reduces the subsidy from the taxpayer.

Development ideas on Recreation sites ended

In the Spring newsletter we highlighted consultation being carried out alongside Magna Housing regarding five recreation sites in the town, to consider the potential for developing them to provide much needed affordable housing for young workers.

At two consultation events and by e-mail the Council received well over 300 representations covering all of the sites, almost unanimously opposing development. As a result at its meeting in March the Council decided not to progress the ideas further. The sites will now be retained for recreational purposes.

This decision does not cover the development of the tennis courts to the rear of Trinity Street Car Park, where the Council continues to support the Dorchester Area Community Land Trust to develop c. 20 flats for young workers.
