1. **APOLOGIES**

Apologies for absence were received from Cllr G. Jones, Cllr F. Kent-Ledger, Cllr R. Major, R. White (National Trust) and V. Smith (Shire Hall Historic Courthouse Museum).

2. **ELECTION OF CHAIR**

As the chair (Cllr G. Jones) had given his apologies for the meeting a chair was elected to stand-in during his absence. Cllr Sue Biles was nominated by Cllrs S. Jones and seconded by Cllr L. Fry and unanimously elected by members as chair for the meeting.

3. **MINUTES**

The minutes of the meeting held on 15th April 2025, a copy of which had been circulated, were confirmed and signed.

4. **DECLARATION OF PREDETERMINATION**

None were declared.

5. **BUDGET UPDATE**

An update report on the committee's budget was presented by the Assistant Town Clerk.

RESOLVED

That the budget update be noted.

6. **HERITAGE TOURISM STRATEGY - UPDATE**

Matilda Manley presented an update on progress with the Heritage Tourism Strategy and the work of the Tourism Partnership. The Partnership's review of tourism leaflets had resulted in a future focus on a two-sided 'teaser' leaflet and a more detailed Town Guide. The Partnership has also agreed to support a new Kite Festival in 2026, with the Roman festival likely to return in 2027. Mark Chutter suggested that future Dorchester Arts' brochures could highlight the new tourist information point in the Corn Exchange. Cllr Stella Jones asked how tourism leaflets were being promoted/distributed at train stations in the region. Matilda reported that she was working with Southern Railways and GWR to place tourism posters at stations in the region and there would hopefully be interactive information on a new digital screen in Dorchester South Station. It was agreed to investigate which company was responsible for distributing tourism leaflets at stations in the region.

RESOLVED

That the report on the activities of the Tourism Partnership was noted.

7. **PROPOSAL FOR MOULE PROJECT**

Mark Chutter and Maria Gayton presented their outline proposal for a project to celebrate the life and achievements of Reverend Moule and which would be the subject of a funding bid to the National Lottery Heritage Fund. The project could be multi-disciplinary (e.g. history, science and music) and involve a range of partners. Cllr S. Jones stated that there already information plaques/signs about Moule in Fordington and the replica of the water closet in Dorset Museum, however the plaque that used to be on the Moule Institute was in storage somewhere a could be reinstated close to the site of the Institute. M. Manley suggested that the project could link with the annual science festival in Dorchester. Cllr S. Biles suggested that the project could be developed further via a small task & finish group and the following volunteered to join the group: M. Gayton, M. Chutter, A. Worth, Cllr S. Jones, and Cllr S. Biles.

The Task & Finish Group would report back to the next Committee meeting with a refined project proposal and suggested funding sources.

RESOLVED

That a Task & Finish Group be established to develop the Moule interpretation project further.

8. **HERITAGE INFORMATION PANELS**

The Assistant Town Clerk presented proposals for the replacement of a weathered heritage information panel outside The Keep. It was also noted by Cllr Taylor that the Poundbury Camp information panel had been damaged. It was agreed that both panels should be replaced using the Committee's budget.

RESOLVED

That both 'The Keep & Marabout Barracks' and 'Poundbury Camp' heritage information panel be replaced.

9. **ON-GOING PROJECTS**

Updates on the following were received:

- a) **Heritage Open Day 2025.** Ian Gosling noted that the Civic Society would have a stall at the Town Pump on HOD. Andy Worth mentioned that the New Hardy Players would be performing at Max Gate on that weekend.
- b) **Town Pump enhancement proposals.** Ian Gosling presented the Civic Society's plans for the restoration of the Town Pump. The work would depend on the condition of the iron pins within the structure and a cover meter survey was being commissioned to 'scan' the structure. The cost of the survey would be £580.

RESOLVED

That a grant of £580 be allocated towards the cost of the cover meter survey of the Town Pump.

- c) **The Dorchester Story project.** Ian Gosling reported that the students had completed their research and it will be uploaded to Discover Dorchester by October.
- d) **Sylvia Townsend Warner stature project.** Mark Chutter reported that the statue will be unveiled on Cracker Night followed by a reception at the Kings Arms.
- e) **Moynton Road commemorative stone.** The Assistant Town Clerk reported that Grassby's Memorials had offered to refurbish the stone at their own expense given the family's long association with the Thomas Hardy School. This generous offer by the Grassbys was welcomed by the Committee.

10. **UPDATES FROM MEMBERS**

Riverside Reserve: Linda Poulsen reported on conservation work at the reserve and recent incidents of anti-social behaviour.

Dorchester Association: Michael Rice circulated the Association's autumn lecture programme.

Thomas Hardy Society: Miranda Woodgate reported on the Society's War Poetry conference at the Dorford Centre from 7th to 9th November followed by a concert at St Mary's Church. Mark Chutter asked if there could be a discussion at the next meeting regarding the reorientation of the Thomas Hardy statue at Top o' Town so that it would face the Walks rather than the road

Dorset Museum & Art Gallery. Claire Dixon reported that Austen exhibition was going well and overall attendance is up compared to previous years. In the autumn, there will be a Dorset Open Art exhibition in partnership with Dorset Visual Arts. Works to the Victorian Gallery roof will take place in 2026.

Cllr Richard Biggs reported that as a result of establishing a Local Visitor Economy Partnership, Dorset Council and BCP Council will be funding a destination management plan.

Dorset History Centre – Maria Gayton reported on plans for Rail 200 conference and ongoing work on a funding bid for capital improvements. Research on Dorchester in Boston would be reported to the next meeting.

Dorset Council archaeology service – Steve Wallis reported that the annual cleaning of the Roman town house mosaic was planned.

Dorchester Civic Society: Ian Gosling, in response to a question from Cllr S. Jones, reported that the society was involved in surveying the water meadows with the aim of enabling Dorset Council to designate them as a Local Heritage Asset.

ITEM 4:

DORCHESTER JOINT HERITAGE COMMITTEE – 14 OCTOBER 2025 DORCHESTER TOURISM PARTNERSHIP UPDATE

The last Tourism Partnership meeting was well attended. It was hosted at The Duchess of Cornwall Inn and Anthony Woodhouse joined us for the meeting. A new representative from English Heritage joined the meeting. Dorset Hideaways have now joined the Dorchester Tourism Partnership but were unable to attend this meeting. The following items were discussed/mentioned:

- Tourist Information Point is now open at Corn Exchange.
- Website hits are down as more people are using Chat GPT. This is not unique to DiscoverDorchester.co.uk
- Two-sided 'teaser leaflet' is now printed and going out for distribution around Dorset and bordering counties.
- Tourism Partnership are reevaluating the Town guide. This was going to be a booklet that people collect from in and around Dorchester with maps, walking routes, cycling routes, attractions guide, shopping, heritage info etc. Some questioned whether this much print is sustainable. Others questioned the size and cost of the design and print.
- Events:
 - Dorchester Walking Festival to run again in 2026 from 2nd May to 10th May. This avoids Isle of Wight Walking Festival and includes the May Day Bank Holiday.
 - Kite Festival on Great Field in approved for 6th June 2025.
- The current campaign focus for the tourism partnership is to promote Dorchester as a base from which to explore Dorset – "Explore Dorset from the Heart".
- **Hardy 2028** project update given and tourism partnership happy with developing plans.
- Tourism Partnership will be hosting a popular social media influencer during 2026 February Half term. A mother and son who are very interested in British history and the Royal Family. They are English Heritage members and National Trust members. 167k followers on Instagram. 78.8k subscribers on YouTube.
- The partnership discussed areas for action and marketing focus next year. Ideas included: Cruise ships, Dorchester's links with Bayeux, stop of in Dorchester on the way to Cornwall, how welcoming the people in Dorchester are.

SYLVIA TOWNSEND WARNER STATUE – INFORMATION PANEL

1. The following text is proposed for the information panel to be mounted on the side of Hotter shoe shop in South Street next to the Thomas Hardy board, adjacent to Barclays Bank.

Here is the statue of Sylvia Townsend Warner (1893 - 1978). The sculpture was designed and created by Denise Dutton and commissioned by Visible Women UK in partnership with the Dorchester Joint Heritage Committee. The statue was crowdfunded by the public in 2024 and the committee consisted of Anya Pearson, Mark Damon Chutter, Tabitha Schofield and Nicole Brugger.

Sylvia Townsend Warner was a trailblazer for the LGBTQ+ community and lived openly with her partner Valentine Ackland in East Chaldon and Frome Vauchurch in Maiden Newton from the 1920s onwards . Both women formed an eclectic and bohemian mini-Bloomsbury group alongside artists such as the Powys family and Elizabeth Muntz. Warner was a musicologist, a novelist and poet. Her most notorious book is ‘ Lolly Willowes ’ (1926) which is a feminist response to witchcraft.

Warner was often in Dorchester. There is an extract from her diary dated 1942 when sadly the writer Virginia Woolf(1882-1941)passed away in Lewes in Sussex:

‘At Boots Library the young woman put into my hands Woolf’s last book. And I received an extraordinary impression how light it was, how small, and frail. As though it was the premature-born child, and motherless, and literally, the last light handful remaining of that fall and abundant woman. The feeling has haunted me all day .’

Ackland died in 1969 and Warner in 1978. Their love for each other was enduring . This is the first non-royal statue of a woman in Dorchester. Warner is now elevated to her rightful place alongside Thomas Hardy and William Barnes. REQUEST FOR BLUE PLAQUE FOR 51 HIGH WEST STREET

1. The owners of 51 High West Street have asked if the Heritage Committee would kindly provide a blue plaque as the building once belonged to Thomas Hardy. The owners have called it *Thomas Hardy Town House*.
2. The property has been renovated by its new owners, John Cobley and Antoinette Weller, and the Thomas Hardy Society have validated the link between Thomas Hardy and the property.
3. The proposed wording for the blue plaque is as follows:

THOMAS HARDY (1840–1928). *Owned by the Poet and Novelist, during the period in which he wrote A Changed Man, seated at the front window. This house is uniquely named by its actual street address in his work.*
4. The committee last purchased a Blue Plaque to commemorate the Reverend Moule and a similar 15” cold cast GRP plaque will cost approximately £700. However, the owners of 51 High West Street have stated that the planning consent for the restoration of the property does not allow for the use of plastic materials for exterior fittings. The proposed plaque could, therefore, be fabricated in cast aluminium within a £700 budget, with the property owner taking responsibility for installation.
5. The Committee has an amount allocated in its budget for the purchase of blue plaque (£1,400) and with the Committee’s consent this can be used to purchase the plaque.
6. **Recommendation:** That the Committee agrees to fund the fabrication of a Blue Plaque for 51 High West Street, as set out in this report, to commemorate the property’s links with Thomas Hardy.

ITEM 7.

DORCHESTER JOINT HERITAGE COMMITTEE – 14TH OCTOBER 2025 PROPOSAL FOR THOMAS HARDY VICTORIAN FAYRE

1. The Committee has, for many years, led on the organisation of the biannual Thomas Hardy Victorian Fayre held in High West / East Street. The Fayre has always taken place on a Sunday typically the day after the ceremony to lay a wreath at Thomas Hardy's statue to commemorate his birthday.
2. The last time the Fayre was held was in June 2023 and it was agreed with the committee not to hold the event in 2025 but instead to delay it until 2026 and then for the next fayre to take place in 2028 as part of the celebrations of the hundredth anniversary of Hardy's death. This would re-instate the two-year cycle and provide a lead-up to the 2028 celebrations.
3. It is proposed, therefore, that the Fayre takes place on Sunday 31st May 2026.
4. The key costs for organizing the event will include:
 - c. £2,500 for the road closure and diversion signage.
 - c. £3,000 for an event organiser
 - c. £1,000 for security
 - c. £500 for first aid
 - c. £1,000 promotion and publicity
 - £2,000 for activities and entertainment.

In addition, there will be costs associated with entertainment, re-enactment groups and activities.

5. When it was last held in 2023, the Fayre cost almost £10,000 but this was offset by sponsorship of approximately £4,500.
6. It is proposed, therefore, that the Committee agrees a budget of £10,000 from its Events budget (which has a current balance of £19,908). However, where possible, sponsorship should be sought to offset the cost.
7. With regard to the content of the event, there should be an emphasis on authenticity and quality – with a focus on arts, crafts and rural skills/trades.
8. Recommendation: It is recommended that the Committee:
 - a) agrees the date of 31st May 2026 for the Thomas Hardy Victorian Fayre;
 - b) allocates £10,000 to the event from the Committee's events budget;
 - c) agrees the procurement of the services of an event organiser to oversee the planning and implementation of the Fayre.

- It should also be noted that the event will benefit from the support from local businesses, including the King's Arms (providing a free venue for the *Dorchester Old & New* introductory talk) and the PIP at The Great Field.
- Particular credit is due to Joe Doak and Anthony Harrison for running the Dorchester Civic Society stall at the Town Pump throughout the day. They had displays of old maps of the town and other heritage information, and attracted a lot of interest from passers-by and those gathering to join guided walks.
- Budget.** A budget of £2,450 was agreed for all aspects of the event although it was delivered for a total cost of £1,815, not including the staff and volunteer time.
- An invitation to provide feedback has been sent to all those who booked via Eventbrite. In addition, ad hoc feedback has been received via a variety of sources (e.g. emails to Sunninghill School and comments to walk leaders) – and all has been extremely positive.

6. Although the booking system worked well, the fact that the events were all free did mean that some of those who had booked did not turn up – although in most cases their places were filled by those joining on the day.
7. If the event is to run again in 2026, then the following are recommended:
 - It is important that there are sufficient tours and events that don't require pre-booking (e.g. Corn Exchange and St Peter's bell tower).
 - The guided walks were very popular but there needs to be flexibility for participants to join on the day if those who have booked don't turn up.
 - 'Behind the scenes' tours are very popular, as are tours of notable buildings not normally accessible to the public (e.g. Sunninghill).
 - Better planning of itineraries – for those who want to attend more than one event during the day and would like time to get from one venue to the other.
8. The event was a great success and could not have been achieved without the hard work and goodwill of range of partners and volunteers.
9. In 2026, national Heritage Open Day is between 11th and 20th September. The Iron Man Race takes place on 20th September and the County Show is likely to be on 6th September, so the most likely date for Dorchester heritage open day will be 13th September but this will be confirmed with the Committee early in 2026.
