Before a Flood

Understand your flood risk and be prepared!

In Dorchester there are 4 main types of flooding - River, Surface Water, Ground Water and Sewage Flooding.

- Visit Gov.uk/flood or call Floodline 0345 988 1188 to:
 - Check long term flood risk to your home and area
 - Check current flood situation, 5 day flood forecast and main river, groundwater and rainfall levels
 - Sign up to the Environment Agency
 free Flood Warning service for main
 river and groundwater flooding
 - Download and complete a personal or business flood plan
 - Find guidance on how to prepare for flooding
- Sign up to Metoffice National Severe Weather Warning Service via web or app
- Chat to neighbours and friends about how you could help each other
- Keep useful numbers handy

Things to pack in an emergency...

- Insurance details, landlord's, and banking details
- Medication / copy of prescription
- Spare glasses / contact lenses
- Clothes, food and water
- Torch and wind-up radio
- Baby nappies, food and toys

Flood Protection

Under civil law, individual property owners are responsible for protecting their property and land from flooding.

By storing your own flood protection there is a better chance of stopping water from entering your property

What protection to pick?

Sandbags can be useful but may not be the most effective option. They are heavy, hard to place and can still seep water through them.

Why not consider...

- Air brick covers
- Fitted doorway flood protection
- Hydrosacks
- Toilet seal
- Fitting a pump

Block sinks and toilets with heavy filled plastic sacks to stop water coming up through them.

For highways, surface water or ground water flooding contact **Dorset Council** or **Wessex Water**

During a Flood

If you receive a flood warning or a Met Office severe weather warning:

- Take appropriate action
- If safe to do so, report flooding using useful contacts list (if in danger dial 999)
- Turn off gas, water and electric... Make sure you know how to do this before a flood
- Move important items to upstairs or on higher shelves
- Check on neighbours if safe to do so, or warn them if flooding might occur
- Keep your family and pets safe

After a Flood

Flood water can contain harmful contaminants, be careful when coming into contact with it

- Contact your insurer
- Emergency services will connect you with housing if needed
- Wear protective gear when cleaning up and wash hands after
- Dispose of sandbags if used
- Do not turn on gas or electric until checked by a technician
